

A Seed Gathering Experience by Richard Carter

Last October, gathering at the split rail fence with plastic bags and samples of the plants from which the seeds were to be gathered, a small group of volunteers received instructions on how to pick different kinds of seeds and how much to gather from any one area.

It was intriguing to me, as a new volunteer, how the mind could eventually be programmed and the eye calibrated to distinguish just these distinctive forms from all others when, at first, there seemed to be just an undifferentiated mass of plant material. I came to admire the individual plant forms and greet them as familiar friends.

At first, the noise from Waukegan Road was extremely distracting and we had to move away from the parking lot to hear when instructions were being given. During the gathering of seeds, I became aware of how fragile and insular this little piece of precious land was. It was tightly bound by all the forces that had destroyed the rest of its kind. There, in the middle of the Grove, listening to the constant sound of automobile traffic at its fringes, hearing the heavy laboring of a freight train just to the west, the scream of jets overhead and the ominous clank of a bulldozer nearby, I was confronted by a sense of the self-destructive lunacy our way of life is creating for us. In that moment, only this sanctuary made any sense, a breathing place, a time-out, a shift in perspective, a chance to ask questions about the destiny towards which we are unknowingly hurling ourselves.

In time, the clamor seemed to fade and a realm of peacefulness pervaded. There was something very ancient and eternal evoked by the simple act of gathering seed for the future, something deeply satisfying and right. I could begin to understand why so many volunteers had come for so many years to take part in all the rituals of seed gathering, brush cutting, burning and planting, wanting to set their hand on making things right in this landscape. Signs

of their labor were all around, especially the brush clearing, but what I couldn't see were the changes created in over 10 years of work. That was their special privilege. It must be one of the reasons they keep returning.

Yes, We Use Garlon By Bob Schmugge

The primary herbicide used on the North Branch is Garlon. Garlon is used to control the growth of invasive, alien species such as European buckthorn. Without herbicides, all of that brush cutting volunteers do on Sunday mornings would be for naught because the brush would grow back quickly and more thickly. Herbicides keep the brush from growing back and allow the rare prairie and savanna seeds to germinate and grow without being shaded out or overtaken by more aggressive plants. In the words of Ron Panzer, "We will never succeed (in restoring prairies or savannas) without herbicide."

On February 1, The Illinois Nature Conservancy sponsored a special day for volunteers to take the Department of Agriculture's Public Operator's exam on the use of pesticides. Several North Branch volunteers are now qualified to handle and apply herbicides, which are one kind of pesticide. With proper and safe use, herbicides like Garlon can be effective allies in the restoration of prairies and savannas in northeastern Illinois.

The NORTH BRANCH PRAIRIE PROJECT is working to restore and manage the few remaining prairie remnants along the North Branch of the Chicago River in the Cook County Forest Preserves. These areas, once part of a vast grassland ecosystem, are under tremendous pressure from urban development and non-native species. We are working to restore conditions that will allow these natural wild communities to flourish as a permanent part of the metropolitan area.

In the spring we rake in seed, plant flora grown in volunteer gardens, cut brush, and conduct controlled burns. Always dress for the weather and bring some water. Bring some food if you can stay for lunch. The workday hotline is 312 878-3877.

NBPP SCIENCE FILE HAS A HOME AT THE CHICAGO BOTANIC GARDEN

NBPP's science library, compiled and organized by Susanne Masi and Joanne Softcheck, is a comprehensive collection of all the science-related studies done on North Branch sites over the past 15 years. It includes plant and insect inventories, vegetation transects, historical management records, site maps, articles, studies and North Branch publications. The Chicago Botanic Garden's library has generously agreed to house the file which is available for use during the library hours, 10am to 4pm, Monday through Saturday. Materials may not be checked out, but a copy machine is available in the library. (The Botanic Garden is located in Glencoe on Lake Cook Road, one half-mile east of Eden's Expy. There is a \$3 parking fee to enter the Garden by car; you may walk or bike in free of charge.)

A second copy of the science file is kept by Joanne Softcheck. If you wish copies of file materials, Joanne will provide them at cost within a reasonable time of the request. Call Joanne at 312 878-3877.

VOLUNTEERS SOUGHT TO PARTICIPATE IN INSECT, PLANT, HERP AND BIRD STUDIES

NBPP has received funding from the Forest Preserve District of Cook County this year to conduct entomological and herpetological studies as well as plant inventories and transects. Ron Panzer, noted for his research on native insects, will coordinate the entomological program and Tom Anton of the Chicago Herpetological Society will do the herp studies. Jerry Sullivan and Jeff Rovner are looking for more volunteers to expand their bird-nesting surveys. Interns will be hired for the plant studies. Volunteers interested in any of these areas are needed to monitor traps, search out herps, assist with transects and help listen and look for nesting birds. The panel will include representatives from the scientific community, public agencies, commercial seed producers, and volunteer ecological restoration groups. Discussion will be focused on questions raised at the 1991 Prairie Conference held in DeKalb. For example, how much seed should be collected from sites which may differ in many ways? How important is it to use local ecotypes? How can we encourage responsible, ethical seed collecting behavior? Questions and comments from the audience will be invited.
