

NORTH BRANCHER JANE BALABAN ELECTED TO TNC BOARD

Jane Balaban has been elected to the board of trustees of The Nature Conservancy's Illinois Chapter. The conservation organization with over 30,000 members statewide is led by its volunteer board of community leaders and scientists. Her election came at the Chapter's annual meeting in September at Spears Woods in the Palos Forest Preserves of southwestern Cook County.

Balaban, a stalwart of the North Branch Prairie Project, is a Clinical Pharmacy Manager for Evanston Hospital and has been with the hospital since 1977.

"Jane's wealth of experience and her commitment to conservation are invaluable assets to our board of trustees," according to Bruce Boyd, Director of the Conservancy's Illinois Chapter. "We're grateful she is including The Nature Conservancy among her many endeavors."

Joining the board with Balaban are: Herman G. Bodewes of Springfield, Matteson resident William P. Braker, Thomas F. Crosby of downstate Marion, Wendy J. Paulson of Barrington, and Kyle Robeson of Champaign.

The Nature Conservancy is an international nonprofit conservation organization with nearly 800,000 members nationwide, dedicated to preserving rare plants and animals by protecting the lands and waters they need to survive. The NBPP is part of its Volunteer Stewardship Network.

MIGHTY ACORNS SPROUT ALONG THE NORTH BRANCH

A year ago, in the Sixteenth Year Report, I wrote about the educational potential for using our sites as classrooms. When that article was written only a few school trips were scheduled for Somme Nature Preserve and Wayside Woods Prairie. Since then, grammar school children have taken trips to SNP, Somme Prairie Grove, and to Sauganash Prairie Grove. Robert Lonsdorf

has expressed his willingness to share Miami Woods Prairie with the Mighty Acorns.

How has this experiment worked out? I speculated that there would be challenges—and there have been. Moving large numbers of children through a site requires forethought, organization, and a lot of energy. Many of the parent volunteers were new to our sites, the restoration process, and to naturalizing with small groups of children. Buses are late, or the children have to leave early, and we seem to over-plan for the time available. But it's happening and everyone wants more!

This fall, all school groups collected seeds, QUITE A FEW seeds! With several schools we tried seed processing in both the field and the classroom. Its novelty as a group activity and the logical next step in stewardship was perfect for the Mighty Acorns.

After observing them work (actually, trying to keep up with them!) it is clear that we are just beginning to realize the potential for having school children be an integral part of restoration work. The challenge is to efficiently and effectively channel those energies and to teach as we have been taught by the North Branch. The goal of shaping this potential is big. It's a call to everyone who loves our work and believes in its future.

Another pleasant surprise has been the interest in the North Branch generated among the parents and teachers. If "seeing is believing" than we have a lot of new believers! One forgets that a parent is attached to every child. Even if the parent is not with the group, the message goes home. A new destination has been added to the family trip list!

Have the sites been affected by so many people? Yes. So far it has been minimal, but each steward needs to decide how much can be expected and tolerated. As more schools join in and more sites come on-line, rotating use according to season and stewardship might be one solution. In any case, using our sites as classrooms is off to a good start. With careful planning, patience, and coordinated effort, it can only get better.

The NORTH BRANCH PRAIRIE PROJECT is working to restore and manage the few remaining prairie and oak savanna remnants along the North Branch of the Chicago River in the Cook County Forest Preserves. These areas, once part of a vast grassland ecosystem, are under tremendous pressure from urban development and non-native species. We are working to restore conditions that will allow these natural wild communities to flourish as a permanent part of the metropolitan area.

Directions

BUFFALO GROVE PRAIRIE (Buffalo Grove)—Take Lake Cook Road to Hastings Road (one street west of railroad overpass and one mile west of Milwaukee Avenue). Turn north on Hastings to second lot on the right (one lot past new CDW). Park at east end of the lot nearest the prairie.

BUNKER HILL/OXBOW (Chicago)—Meet at the Bunker Hill Forest Preserve parking lot on the west side of Caldwell Ave. about 1/4 mile north of Devon Ave.

EMILY OAKS NATURE CENTER (Skokie)—From intersection of Skokie Blvd. and Howard St., go east on Howard to first residential street, Knox. Go north on Knox to Brummel. Turn left on Brummel and go one block to Nature Center parking lot.

GLENBROOK HIGH SCHOOL (Northbrook)—North of Willow Rd. on the west side of Shermer Road. Enter the parking lot at the north driveway and park by the tennis courts.

HARMS WOODS (Glenview)—Meet at Forest Preserve Grove parking lot on the west side of Harms Rd., just south of Glenview Rd.

MIAMI-INDIGO (Morton Grove-Niles)—Meet at Miami Woods Prairie Forest Preserve parking lot on the east side of Caldwell Ave., two blocks north of Oakton Ave.

PERKINS WOODS (Evanston)—From 194 exit at Old Orchard Rd., east to Crawford St., south on Crawford to Grant St., east on grant to Ewing St., site is at the corner of Grant and Ewing.

SAUGANASH PRAIRIE (Chicago)—Meet at the edge of the Forest Preserve along the south side of Bryn Mawr Ave. at Kilbourn Ave. (south of Peterson Ave. and east of Cicero Ave.)

SOMME NATURE PRESERVE (Northbrook)—Meet in the Post Office parking lot, Dundee and Western Avenues.

SOMME PRAIRIE GROVE, WOODS, AND SEDGE MEADOW (Northbrook)—Take Dundee Rd. two miles west from the Edens Expressway to Waukegan Rd. Go north a few hundred feet on Waukegan and meet at the unpaved parking area on the west side of the road.

WATERSMEET/SKOKIE SEDGE MEADOWS (Northfield)—Exit the Edens Expressway at Lake Avenue West. Go west to Wagner Rd., turn north then take Wagner to Winnetka Rd. Go east on Winnetka 3/4 mile. Park on the south side of the street.

WAYSIDE/RR PRAIRIE (Morton Grove)—Meet at Wayside Woods Prairie Forest Preserve parking lot on Lehigh Ave. (a few blocks east of Waukegan Rd. and just north of Dempster Ave.

"Many hands make light work," my mother used to tell my nine siblings and me as we ioined forces to whiz through our chores and dash out to play. In the North Branch. too. it takes the combined efforts of many individuals to accomplish our restoration goals.

Growth is key to all activities as we expand the number of sites, and there is a growing need for new recruits.

Right now, volunteers are needed to help in a small or a big way with any of these activities. All foster volunteer growth.

GREET new volunteers at workdays. Friendly individuals are needed to be workday greeters when they can. Make newcomers feel welcome and be available for their questions and comments. This important activity also needs a coordinator—to keep in touch with the greeters and to schedule them for workdays: to collect the sign-in sheets periodically; and to see who should be contacted.

CALL new volunteers after they have attended their first workday to see how their experience was, answer any questions they may have, invite them to attend future workdays, and make sure we add them to our mailing lists, if desired.

HELP PLAN EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS AND TOURS. Many volunteers are eager to learn the plants and understand the ecology of North Branch sites. The NBPP is fortunate to have knowledgeable volunteers who give generously of their time and expertise to teach. Volunteers are needed to schedule educational offerings and tours and to coordinate registration and publicity for them.

Even if you can be a greeter a few times a year, or at just one site; if you can help coordinate just one course, perhaps one you'd like to take yourself; or organize just one tour at your favorite site, you can make a difference. A GOOD GOOD DEED DAY

Sauganash Prairie was visited by members of Emanuel Congregation (5959 N. Sheridan Road, Chicago) who joined the North Branch Prairie Project to collect seed. Our efforts were part of a congregation-wide "Mitzvah Day" (or Good Deed Day) in which synagogue members participated in social action projects around our community. Other projects included painting and repair work at homeless shelters, singing at nursing homes, a blood drive, and making over 600 sandwiches to be distributed through a neighborhood shelter.

Those of us who did seed collecting truly had a remarkable afternoon. It was a beautiful autumn day and the reserve was displaying its fall splendor including a family of deer that were unfortunately scared away by this city girl's excitement upon seeing them! We were all amazed to find this jewel of nature nestled in a metropolitan neighborhood. Luckily we had an enthusiastic eight-year-old who voraciously asked questions we ALL had on our minds about our community's natural history and this fascinating prairie ecosystem.

There's little more spiritual and moving than the beauty and complexity of nature itself. But what made the day so important was that we spent our time doing more than just appreciating nature with our eyes; we helped to restore nature with our hands. Judaism teaches that we all share in the responsibility for repairing our world (in Hebrew, Tikkun Olam) in order to prepare it for the coming of the messiah.
