NORTH BRANCH RESTORATION PROJECT SPRING 2002

RED TAPE (and Brush) CUT!

After five long years, President John Stroger has finally lifted the restriction on cutting brush at Miami and Indian Road Woods. The President's wise decision was hastened by the Red Tape event instituted by John Thill, Mary Busch and Friends of Morton Grove Forest Preserves.

Frustrated by the unhealthy changes they saw at Miami, this determined group of neighbors organized an event to publicize the damage done by the



moratorium and to show public support for good management. They deliberately 23rd to coincide with National

Public Lands Day, an annual event when the public is encouraged to do hands-on work taking care of public land all over the nation.

The Miami Woods sign was swathed with symbolic red ribbon to highlight the theme "Red Tape is Killing



Miami Woods!" while Friends members handed out information and talked with hikers and bikers along the bike trail. Over 700 people, including the Mayor and all the Trustees of

Morton Grove, signed petitions urging President Stroger to reinstate management.

During the five years of enforced neglect, buckthorn and other aggressive woody species have grown steadily in the prairie and woodlands, killing off the native sun-loving species. So it was with great

enthusiasm that we began the process of regaining lost ground.

More than 40 North Branch volunteers gathered on Saturday, December 22nd, to celebrate the return to work at the beautiful Miami Woods site. We were joined in the work by two special volunteers, County Commissioner Mike Quigley and candidate for County Commissioner Larry Suffredin. Mike has been a strong supporter of the land management program and the volunteer program during his first four years as Commissioner. He has worked hard and effectively to get the restoration program back on track.

Larry has made the Forest Preserves a core part of his campaign, and comments that "As I learn more about the current condition of the Cook County Forest Preserve District I realize that volunteers are the only comprehensive chose September land restoration unit that exists... I was especially impressed by the sense of dedication and knowledge the volunteers exhibited."

The most exciting award was presented by Debra Shore to the Friends of Morton Grove Forest Preserves for their work on getting the Miami Woods site back to active management. Debra took the stage entwined in red ribbons to remind us of the "Red-Tape" action along the bike trail in

which the Morton Grove Friends collected well over 700 names on a petition last summer. The reinstatement of Miami as a restoration site came soon after the Work," in which the audience participated. - * Jane Balaban recognized Terry Schilling for designing and managing our website, of our mailing list, and much of our communication.
- * Jane also recognized the Village of Glenview for preservation work at the Air Station Prairie; Robyn Flakne accepted.
- * Steve Packard thanked Larry Hodak for generously adopting other sites when his site was taken out of management by the moratorium.

As always, the entertainment showed that North Branchers have many talents in addition to sawing and

brushpile construction. After our big meal, Rob Sulski and Steve Packard opened the evenings program with "The Buckthorn



Blues" (actual guitar and harmonica for this one). The Bullfrogs (a growing group of singers led by Natalie Leki) performed several songs, including "Praise the Work," in which the audience participated. Joy Trukowski closed, accompanying herself on the guitar, by singing several songs, including "The Brush Pile of

Love" (see later in Brush Piles), a hot number that was written for the occasion.

And thus we celebrated another annual potluck, with time to rejoice in the work of the past year, time to be serious and sentimental and silly: a midwinter celebration.



NEW NORTH BRANCH SITE

A new site has been accepted by the North Branch Restoration Project. Adjacent to the Railroad Prairie and Linne Woods in Morton Grove where Gladys Bryer and Bob Bluestone are stewards, the site has been a part of the Deep Tunnel Project for about a decade.

This very disturbed area differs greatly from the remnant prairies and woodlands that are currently being managed by our group. However, the almost 30 acres of land is next to high integrity natural areas and the Morton Grove Forest Preserves and NBRP. bordered in the east by the North Branch of the Chicago River. This is why it has been important to NBRP to monitor and influence decisions made here over the last ten years.

Upon completion of the tunnel work and hauling away of the dolomite mountain that was stored on site, engaging 10 seniors in GIS mapping of this site in the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District for Greater Chicago (MWRDGC) transferred a restoration grant to Cook County Forest Preserve District (CCFPD). The proposed restoration plan was approved by the Village of Morton Grove. Wolff Clements, the contractor hired to take the restoration project to where it is today, has finished grading and seeded in a basic prairie mix. Now the responsibility to continue restoration is in the hands of CCFPD. That's where we come in!

Marian Thill and Mary Busch have volunteered to act as apprentice stewards for this new site, under the direction of six mentors; Diane Aoki, John Balaban, Gladys Bryer, Dennis Dreher, Larry Hodak, and Steve Packard.

Marian and Mary have been involved in Environmental Education over the past several years. They have involved elementary school level teachers and students in Morton Grove in woodland wildflower walks, prairie tours, garlic mustard pulls, and many other activities. Marian and Mary have been conducting these activities at Wayside Prairie and Linne Woods with the assistance of Gladys Bryer and many absolutely wonderful volunteers from the Friends of

Marian and Mary have made a connection with Niles North High School (NNHS) Environmental Science teachers to be involved in Ecological Restoration and have plans to involve Niles West High School as well. Sue Trzaskus of NNHS is very enthusiastic about Spring, 2002. Equipped to take on this project through Northwestern University's World Watch program, Sue and her team are part of an effort to involve the community members. They met with Bill Koenig, Volunteer Coordinator for the Forest Preserve District. Donna Cleson of the nearby Delaine Farm residential development and Cynthia Fox of the Friends of the Chicago River will also participate. Mary Walsh, curator of the Morton Grove Historical Museum, a branch of the Morton Grove Park District is also very interested in this project and has been working with Marian to organize bird walks for the community.



Directions:

Air Station Prairie, Glenview - From the Edens Expressway, go west on Willow Road past where the road goes up and over Lehigh. At the bottom of hill turn right and circle under Willow. Go south approximately 1/2 mile to the sign for the Prairie.

Bunker Hill/Oxbow, Chicago - Off Caldwell between Devon and Touhy; entrance located just opposite Tonty Street. For Bunker Hill Meet in first section of parking lot; for Oxbow, follow road until it turns north, then park along the west side.

Harms Flatwoods, Glenview - Meet at the Forest Preserve Grove parking lot on the west side of Harms Road, directly west of Old Orchard Road.

Harms Woods, Glenview - Meet at the Forest Preserve Grove parking lot on the west side of Harms Road, just south of Glenview Road

Indian Road Woods, Chicago - On Central, just north of Indian Road. (Enter off Central Av about 1/2 mile north of Elston Ave.) Proceed to last parking lot that parallels Indian Road.

Miami Woods, Niles/Morton Grove - Located on the east side of Caldwell, two blocks north of Oakton. Meet in the parking lot for Miami Woods.

Sauganash Prairie Grove, Chicago - Meet at the edge of the Forest Preserve along the south side of Bryn Mawr at Kilborn, which is south of Peterson and east of Cicero.

Somme Nature Preserve, Northbrook - From the Edens Expressway, take Dundee Road 2½ miles west (past Waukegan) to Western. Turn north and park in the post office parking lot.

Somme Prairie Grove, Northbrook - From the Edens Expressway, take Dundee Road two miles west to Waukegan Road. Go north a few hundred feet on. Waukegan and turn left into the unpaved parking area by the sign "Somme Woods Prairie."

Somme Woods, Northbrook - From the Edens Expressway, take Dundee Road two miles west and turn right into Somme Woods parking lot (just before the light at Waukegan Road).

Watersmeet Prairie Grove, Northfield - From the Edens Expressway, take Lake Avenue west to Wagner Road. Turn north on Wagner to Winnetka Road. Turn east on Winnetka for ¾ mile. Park on the north side of the street or a side street

Wayside/RR Prairie, Morton Grove - Meet at Wayside Woods Prairie parking lot on Lehigh Ave, a few blocks east of Waukegan Road and just north of Dempster.
