12TH ANNUAL CHICAGO RIVER DAY Saturday, May 8, 2004

The Friends of the Chicago River has come a long way since this event was founded as River Rescue Day in 1992 with 25 volunteers at one location — last year's event attracted 2,700 volunteers to 56 sites along the Chicago River, and cleared more than 38 tons of trash!

Friends invites all to participate in our 12th annual Chicago River Day - individuals, families, schools, groups, service learning students, corporate teams, community groups, boy scouts, girl scouts, conservation societies and more. Participants will remove invasive vegetation, sprucing up river-edge

paths, planting native seedlings, river art, education projects on top of collecting for garbage and sorting for recycling.

On May 8th, volunteers work at a site of their choosing from 9 a.m. to 12 noon. Afterwards, all volunteers are invited to attend the Chicago River Day Festival and picnic to celebrate all their hard work. At the Festival, volunteers will enjoy live music, live animals, a free barbecue for volunteers, canoe rides, and education environmental booths.

The event flier will be published at the beginning of March and the information will be posted on the Friends' website as soon as the information becomes available. PRESCRIBED FIRE FIELD TRAINING AT NACHUSA GRASSLANDS

This is a five-hour hands-on, in the field training that covers fire planning, tools, safety equipment, suppression exercises, and usually a prescribed fire. This is a good workshop for people new to fire or fire training, although experienced practitioners are welcome and have enjoyed this in the past. You need enough physical fitness to walk off trail, carry a tool or pack a distance, and be expecting to use this training on a crew.

HABITAT FOR ILLINOIS WILDLIFE

For anyone interested in Illinois wildlife and their habitats, there's a new book published by the Department of Natural Resources and the University of Illinois called "Creating Habitats and Homes for Illinois Wildlife." With more than 200 color photographs, the book exquisitely depicts Illinois wildlife, but it's also chock full of accessible scientific information about the status of wildlife habitat in Illinois. "The key to making successful wildlife management decisions is to use the best scientific information available. This book compiles, in a user-friendly way, what is known about major habitat issues in our state today," said primary author of the book Debbie Scott Newman, preservation specialist for the Illinois Nature Preserves Commission. Her coauthor is Richard Warner, University of Illinois professor of wildlife ecology. NEW ADDITIONS TO THE ILLINOIS EXOTIC WEEDS LIST

On July 10, Governor Rod R. Blagojevich signed a bill into law that added Buckthorn to the Exotic Weeds list. This list is part of the Illinois Exotic Weeds Act which makes it unlawful to buy, sell, or distribute these plants without a permit from the Illinois Department of Natural Resources. Adding this species to this list is a

critical step forward to preventing its spread in Illinois. Many people called, wrote letters, and voiced their support of this legislation.

2003 notes on Buffalo Grove: Buffalo Grove had a successful prescribed burn on Dec 3rd. It was a cold day and coupled with the necessity of keeping the burn cool resulted in a burn that was not as hot as the volunteers would have liked. Buffalo Grove also has a new chain link fence thanks to a grant Bev Hansen wrote to the US Fish and Wildlife Service. Also, the completed plant survey and transects have helped to illustrate the worth of this little site. The Floristic Quality turned out to be 68 — a very high rating. ComEd paid for the study and continues to be very cooperative. It was a good year in many ways for Buffalo Grove. However, it also saw negative impact from Metra and the Cook County Highway Dept. The damage they did was serious. The Stewards are looking forward to great things in 2004.

GREAT MUNCHING - ON GARLIC MUSTARD!

Eating wild garlic mustard won't put much of a dent in the invasion by one of this region's worst weeds – but it could be good for our soul, and give us energy to pull more!

Teriyaki Garlic Mustard Stir Fry

1 cup young garlic mustard leaves, washed ½ tsp grated ginger root
Pinch sugar
2 tbsp cooking oil
Chinese vegetable
1 tbsp teriyaki sauce

Drop garlic mustard leaves into boiling water for 5 minutes. Drain. Pour oil into pan and add ginger root and Chinese vegetable. Sauté lightly. Add cooked garlic mustard greens and teriyaki sauce to coat vegetables. Serve warm over rice.

Garlic Mustard Salad

 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 1 cup washed garlic mustard small leaves, tender tips with flowers or buds

Add to your favorite salad Some suggestions include:

- Lettuce, leeks, and hardboiled eggs
- Lettuce, tomato, and cucumber
- Chickweed, wild carrot, and mushrooms

Throughout the inspiring emergence of spring, we run through the whole gamut of restoration. In the early weeks, we're still cutting brush and burning brushpiles. But as soon as the ground thaws, we plant seed side-by-side with the brush bashing. Next, garlic mustard kicks in, and for a few weeks the work at many sites will focus on weeding between the trilliums. By the end of spring, we'll already be harvesting and spreading the seeds of the plants that bloomed first – spring beauty, false mermaid, and toothwort. It's a great season! (But aren't they all?!)

NBRP Site Directions & Map

DIRECTIONS:

Air Station Prairie, Glenview – From the Edens expressway; go west on Willow Road, past Waukegan Road and over the RR overpass. Turn south at the new traffic signals for Patriot Blvd. (The new main road through the redeveloped Naval Air Station). Turn east on Compass to the gate at the south end of the prairie. Patriot Blvd. is also accessible from the south via Lake Ave.

Bunker Hill Savanna/Oxbow, Chicago – Off Caldwell between Devon and Touhy; entrance located just opposite Tonty Street. For Bunker Hill Meet in first section of parking lot; for Oxbow, follow road until it turns north, then park along the west side.

Harms Flatwoods, Glenview – Meet at the Forest Preserve Grove parking lot on the west side of Harms Road, directly west of Old Orchard Road.


Harms Woods, Glenview – Meet at the Forest Preserve Grove parking lot on the west side of Harms Road, just south of Glenview Road.

Indian Road Woods, Chicago – Enter at the Indian Road Forest Preserve drive, on the east side of Central Ave, just north of Indian Road (approximately ½ mile south of Caldwell). Meet in the parking area at the far east end of the drive.

Linne North - Meet at the Wayside Woods Prairie parking lot. (See below for direction.)

Miami Woods Prairie, Niles/Morton Grove – Located on the east side of Caldwell, two blocks north of Oakton. Meet in the parking lot for Miami Woods.

Sauganash Prairie Grove, Chicago – Meet at the edge of the Forest Preserve along the south side of Bryn Mawr at Kilbourn, which is south of Peterson and east of Cicero.



Somme Prairie Grove, Northbrook – From the Edens Expressway, take Dundee Road two miles west to Waukegan Road. Go north a few hundred feet on Waukegan and turn left into the unpaved parking area by the sign "Somme Woods Prairie."

Somme Prairie Nature Preserve, Northbrook – From the Edens Expressway, take Dundee Road 2½ miles west (past Waukegan) to Western. Turn north and park in the post office parking lot.

Somme Woods, Northbrook – From the Edens Expressway, take Dundee Road two miles west and turn right into Somme Woods parking lot (just before the light at Waukegan Road).

Watersmeet Prairie Grove, Northfield – From the Edens Expressway, take Lake Avenue west to Wagner Road. Turn north on Wagner to Winnetka Road. Turn east on Winnetka for ¾ mile. Park on the north side of the street or a side street.

Wayside Woods Prairie/Linne RR Prairie, Morton Grove – Meet at Wayside Woods Prairie parking lot on Lehigh Ave, a few blocks east of Waukegan Road and just north of Dempster.
